

Holding Tight to the Stories

Loss and Moving Forward



In early August, I lost my mother. Even when we know loss is inevitable, the reality of it always arrives with a force that unsettles everything. One moment you are going about daily life, and the next you're stopped in your tracks by a memory, a voice, or a story that feels too important to let slip away.

In the days since her passing, I've found myself drawn back to the stories of my family and community — the ones my mother told and the ones I've learned since her death. Some of these discoveries have brought me great joy. Others have opened old wounds that, even after decades, I fear may never fully heal.

My relationship with my mother was never simple. There were stretches of closeness and seasons of silence — months, sometimes years, when our words to each other were few. The last eight months before her death were one of those quiet stretches. I haven't cried since she passed, and for a while I wondered what that meant — whether it said something about me, or about us. But as I've gone through her things and uncovered stories she never told and truths she buried, I've begun to understand that grief doesn't always look like we expect it to. Sometimes

it's not the tears but the questions that linger — questions about who she was, and who I am because of her.


In these weeks, reading old letters and spending time with my father recounting times both good and hard, I've been reminded why I write. Capturing stories that matter has carried me not only through my personal journals but also through the novels I've written. Each book has been a way of honoring the past and looking more deeply at the people who shaped our history and our lives — flawed, beautiful, and complicated as they are.

My family has called Loudoun County home for generations. Its rolling hills, its communities, and its histories are part of who I am. Every time I travel these old dirt roads that wind through the foothills where I grew up, I am reminded that our lives are merely chapters in a much longer book.

And maybe that's where I find my mother now — not only in the memories that ache, but in the stories that keep unfolding. Her life, like all of ours, was a mix of love and silence, truth and secrets. Writing helps me hold those contradictions, to see her not just as the woman who raised me but as someone still teaching me — about grace, about imperfection, about the unfinished stories we leave behind.

Afternoon Tea with Miss Virginia


I recently had the joy of speaking to an inspiring women's group over afternoon tea, with the lovely Katie Rose, Miss Virginia 2023 in attendance.

As the days grow cooler and the light softens into autumn gold, it's the perfect season to curl up with a story that stirs both heart and mind.





Autum is the perfect time to let go, lean in, and begin again. 🗯




#ReadWithSharon Book Club



Old curse, powerful witchcraft and perilous love on the high seas--a perfect read for witch season!





